
A word from the Hon: Sec:

Rays Garden Visits

Trips and Garden Visits undertaken by Kilmersdon Gardens during 1997

May 31

All day visit to Exbury Gardens

In order, hopefully, to enjoy the full beauty of Exbury Gardens it was decided to forego the early Spring visit and bring forward the all day trip to the end of May, only to be frustrated by the earliest flowering spring for 40 years. Consequently many of the rhododendrons and azaleas were over, but it is indeed fortunate that Exbury has so many attractions including the largest rockery areas I have ever seen, large lakes filled with carp, a meadow filled with rare native plants and flowers running down to the river and many hidden gardens and rare trees. It was also fortunate (modesty almost forbids me from saying - a stroke of genius) that we also booked the services of Paul Martin, the head gardener, to give us a guided tour. This tour, by an enthusiast, lasted two hours and included anecdotes about the family, tales about the rivalries between Kew, Wisley and Exbury and even some tricks that the TV cameramen get up to. He also showed us a conifer tree, which looked very dead to me, reputed to be the only remaining specimen in the world. Some of its plant material had been sent to a Wincanton farm in order to attempt rejuvenation!

The visit ended with our members enjoying a tasty tea in the cafe before buying some first class, relatively cheap, plants and shrubs from the well stocked nursery.

All in all a visit that I would recommend any garden club to undertake.

July 9

An evening visit to Withy Lane Farmhouse, the home of Sq. Ldr. And Mrs Tomblin, Followed by a pub supper at the Quarry Arms Keinton, Manderville.

This garden features a superb Kilmarnock Willow which used to be a store house for the hose, watering can etc, and also provide considerable entertainment for the grandchildren. The garden has a system of close planting so that the weeds just don't get a look in. There is a small vegetable garden which is organically maintained but this year there were problems with the Pink Fir Apple Potatoes. They had huge haulm but no tubers larger than a small finger nail. Lifting one of the plants soon provided the answer -bone dry soil. A quite common cause of failure this year and one that I would suggest can be easily overcome by ensuring that the soil, under the haulms is kept moist and occasionally given a feed of weak Chempak 4. After about an hour 33 members gravitated to the Quarry Arms. The large number may have slowed the service but the food was excellent. The conversation was humorous and uninhibited and everyone enjoyed themselves. I think that a pub supper definitely breaks down barriers and is an experiment likely to be repeated by KG next year.



August 13

An evening visit to Barters Farm Nursery, Chapmanslade, Wiltshire.

A visit with an inauspicious start! When 36 members of KG arrived the gates were closed and locked! The hasty and breathless arrival of a member of staff saved me money. I had been told by one member that I should reimburse him for waste of petrol! This was accepted as black humour and one of the 'perks' of being a programme secretary. The nursery, at the time of our visit was being modernised, but there was still plenty to see. Our tour was conducted by the plant propagation manager who showed us the huge beds of plants and shrubs, the new propagating houses, the compost preparation room. The compost is made of 50% composted bark, 50% moss peat, slow release fertiliser and water retaining gel. Finally we were shown the stock plants and shrub area which provided a marvellous view over the Westbury Vale, northwards towards Bath and eastwards to the White horse. On our way back to the plant retail area we were able to examine the automatic watering system. The foolhardy were somewhat closer than the cautious! The visit concluded with tea and biscuits, animated conversations with our guide and the purchase of some superb plants. This visit is a programme secretary's dream. It is entirely free, even the tea and biscuits and the shrubs can be purchased at 10% discount. The Royal Oak at Corsley is only about 2 miles away for those who enjoy good food and real ale

All participants might like to be reminded that the scheme covers Public Liability (not any material loss or damage) against accidents caused by the negligence of Club Officers and Members in the following circumstances:

Accidents at Club Meetings

Accidents at Federation Meetings

Accidents at Flower Shows

Accidents at Outings to Stately Homes organized by Member

Accidents at other Official Outings organized by Member Clubs

Accidents at Official Garden Walks

Accidents arising out of the consumption of food and drink on Club Premises and at Club functions

Any accident to the Public incurred in respect of a member Club carrying out its normal business as a Gardening Club.

There are certain Special Exclusions which should be noted:

- 1. Marathon and sponsored walks or rides
- 2. Firework displays or bonfires
- 3. Injury to participants in 'Its a Knock-Out' or 'Donkey Derby' races
- 4. Loss or damage to articles hired in or personal effects of members
- 5. Special conditions apply to Bouncy Castles so, if any Club is likely to use one for children at their show, do contact our Chairman beforehand for a check of these conditions.

Joyce Harding S.F.G.C. Committee 1984-1997

It is with deep regret that we report the death of Joyce Harding on November 17 1997 after a long illness. Joyce had been a member of the Federation Committee since its foundation in 1984.

In the garden and greenhouse she had special fondness for cultivating and exhibiting begonias, an enthusiasm which she shared with many societies, both as a speaker and as a Indeed, in her own town of Bath she was judge. instrumental in organizing and promoting The Bath Spring Show for many years. As a judge, she was always in demand, eventually serving of the Committee on South West Britain in Bloom. At Bath Horticultural Society she was Honorary Secretary for a long time, before becoming Chairman.

Her cheerfulness, common sense and genuine warmth will be missed by all who knew her, both locally and beyond the County boundaries. Gardening in Somerset and members of the Federation in particular, have lost a very good friend. We extend our sympathies to her husband, Derek and her daughter, Alison. The Somerset Federation of Gardening Clubs has made an appropriate donation to the cancer Unit of the Royal United Hospital, Bath.
